- At Cheselbourne, part of our Information Communication Technology (ICT) curriculum ensures we educate all pupils how to be safe when online.
- Over the year, particularly during Internet Safety Week, we will be exploring the SMART rules.

# The three main risks online are...

- Inappropriate contact – teach children how to recognise and protect themselves against contact with cyber-bullies, hackers, phishers and predators. People aren't always who they say they are.



- **Inappropriate content** – this includes both content that is viewed and content that is uploaded by children. Help children understand that the Internet is forever. Everything they post online is tracked and stored.



- Inappropriate **conduct** – because the web environment can feel anonymous. Teach children that the Internet is a public forum. Help them be the good person *online* that they are when they're *offline*.



# Inappropriate Content

- The most common form of inappropriate content the majority of children at a primary age are exposed to are *music videos*.
- Many music videos have sexual connotations or sexualised dance moves which are the unwittingly copied by children.
- Most music videos, particularly if viewing them through YouTube, have an age rating.

# Inappropriate Content

- In school and at home, one of the biggest issues we face is using search engines, such as: Google and YouTube.
- Even with security restrictions in place you are never fully aware of what could pop up.
- E.g. Pop up Ads, film trailers, inappropriate language and sexualised images.



# PEGI Age Ratings - Online Gaming

- Age ratings ensure that entertainment content – such as films, DVDs, and games – is clearly labelled for the minimum age group for which it is suitable. Since 2012, **PEGI** has been the sole system used in the UK for new console and PC games.
- It is important to note that in the UK, PEGI 12, 16 and 18 ratings are legally enforceable, meaning that they cannot be supplied to persons below those respective age bars.

# Be smart on the internet



**S SAFE** Keep safe by being careful not to give out personal information – such as your full name, email address, phone number, home address, photos or school name – to people you are chatting with online. 

**M MEETING** Meeting someone you have only been in touch with online can be dangerous. Only do so with your parents' or carers' permission and even then only when they can be present. 

**A ACCEPTING** Accepting emails, IM messages, or opening files, pictures or texts from people you don't know or trust can lead to problems – they may contain viruses or nasty messages! 

**R RELIABLE** Information you find on the internet may not be true, or someone online may be lying about who they are. 

**T TELL** Tell your parent, carer or a trusted adult if someone or something makes you feel uncomfortable or worried, or if you or someone you know is being bullied online.
